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Introduction

The *Australian Public Libraries Statistical Report* is an annual project that identifies and measures the usage and activities of Australia's public library services. This statistical report has been compiled on behalf of the National and State Libraries Australia (NSLA) by State Library of Queensland using data supplied by the authority responsible for public library services in each state and territory.

NSLA is the peak body for Australia's national, state and territory libraries. NSLA members also represent the interests of the public library networks within their jurisdictions, and work closely with colleagues in the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA), and the Australian Public Library Alliance (APLA).

1. Selected national statistics 2018-19

Australia's public libraries provide quality information services that support lifelong learning in the community, making a significant contribution to our cultural sector and information industry.

Highlights

- The total expenditure on public libraries increased from \$1.14 billion in 2014-15 to over \$1.32 billion in 2018-19, an increase of 16.4%. On a per capita basis, the total expenditure on public libraries increased by 9.1% over the same period to \$52.38.
- Access to public library services was provided through 1,683 service points, including 1,410 branches, 81 mobiles serving hundreds of separate locations and 191 other outlets.
- There were more than 110 million visits to these physical facilities and an additional 51 million visits to public library websites.
- There were more than 9 million registered members, representing 36% of the total Australian population.
- Total collections of more than 39.2 million items (1.5 items per person) were available for the use of the community, with expenditure of more than \$133 million to ensure that these collections remained up to date and relevant.
- Total usage of public library collections of over 158 million, comprised of more than 136 million loans of physical items and more than 22 million loans, downloads and retrievals from electronic collections.
- More than 273,000 library programs attracted over 7.4 million attendances.
- Public library staff responded to over 8 million requests for information or assistance.

2.1 Expenditure on public library services

Total expenditure on public libraries has grown significantly over the past five years, with an overall increase of 16.4% bringing the Australian total to over \$1.32 billion.

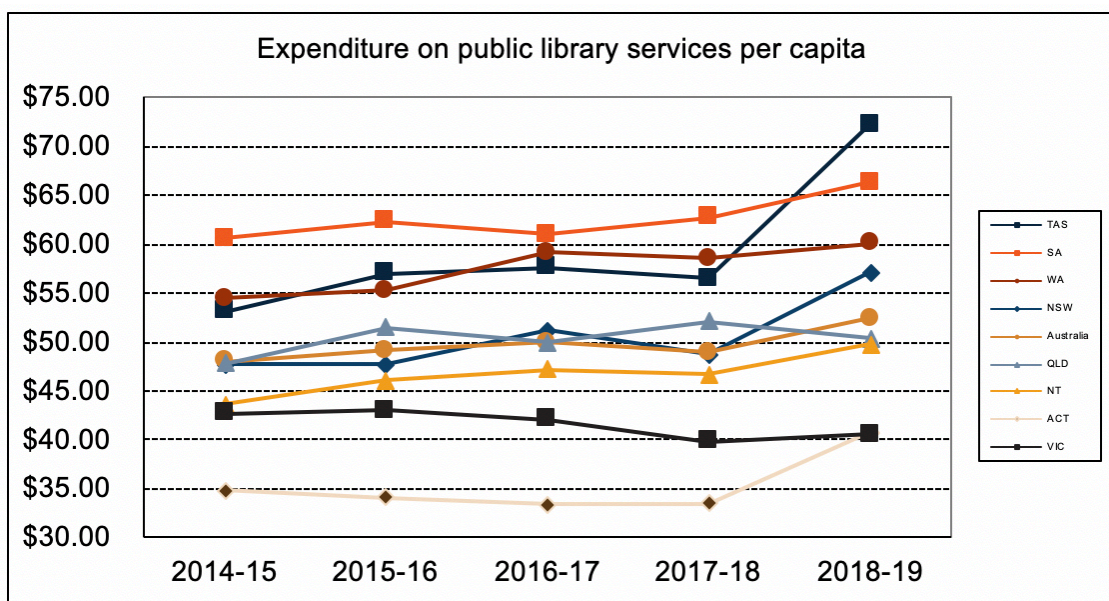

2.1.2 Total expenditure per capita (including capital and collection expenditures)

Nationally, per capita expenditure has grown by 9.1% to \$52.49 over the five-year period. South Australia reported the highest expenditure per capita during the first four years of the period, with Tasmania reporting the highest per capita spend for 2018-19.

2.2.1 Expenditure on public library collections

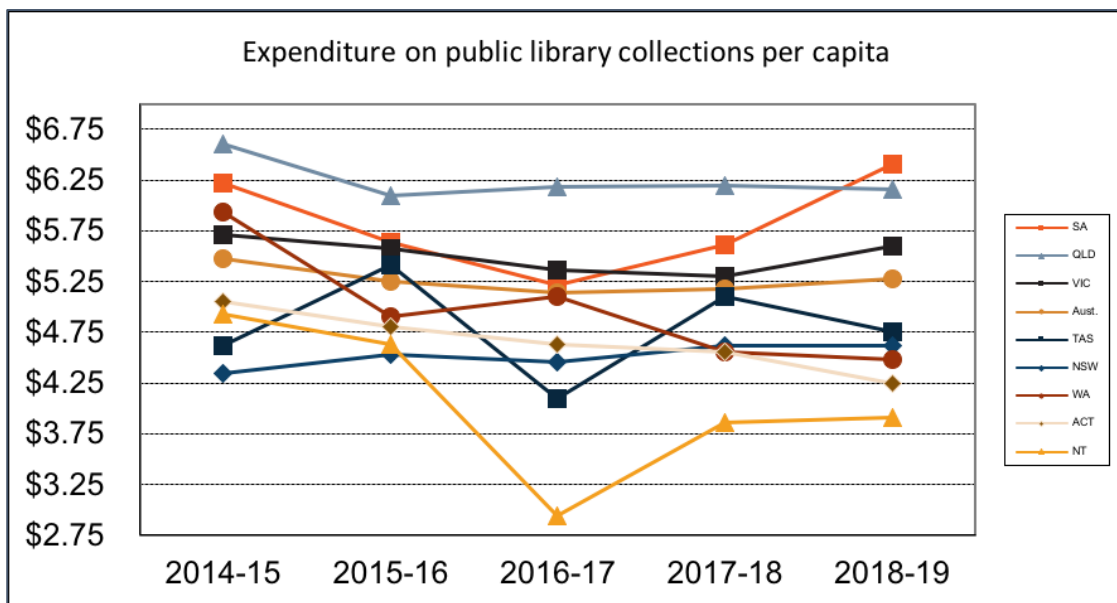
Expenditure on public library collections increased 2.9% during the five-year period, with New South Wales (12.8%) and Victoria (9.0%) reporting significant increases. Western Australia (23.6%) and the Northern Territory (20.1%) reported the most significant decreases over the period.

2.2.2 Expenditure on public library collections per capita

The per capita expenditure on public library collections reflects the total expenditures, with a 3.5% decrease over the five-year period. The most significant decreases in per capita expenditure were reported by Western Australia (24.5%) and the Northern Territory (20.6%).

2.3.1 Total collection usage

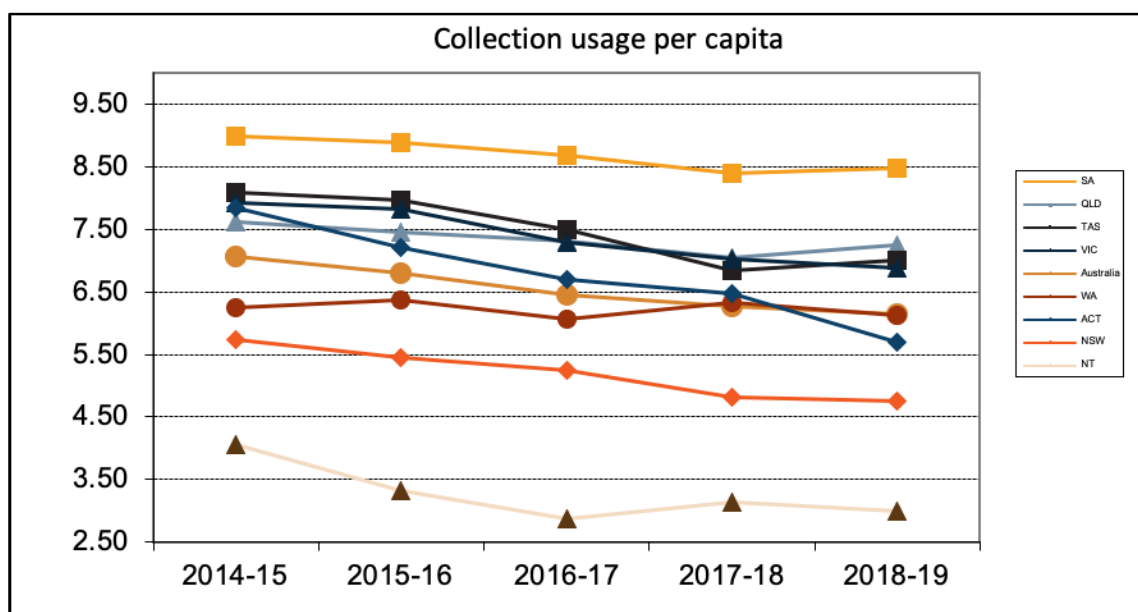
Overall collection usage has decreased over the five-year period by 4.9%. Queensland reported the only increase during the period of 1.3%, with the most significant decreases reported in the Northern Territory (25.9%) and the ACT (20.5%).

2.3.2 Collection usage per capita

At the national level, per capita collection usage has declined by 12.9% over the five-year period, with the largest decreases in the ACT (27.2%) and the Northern Territory (26.3%).

2.4.1 Total public access internet devices

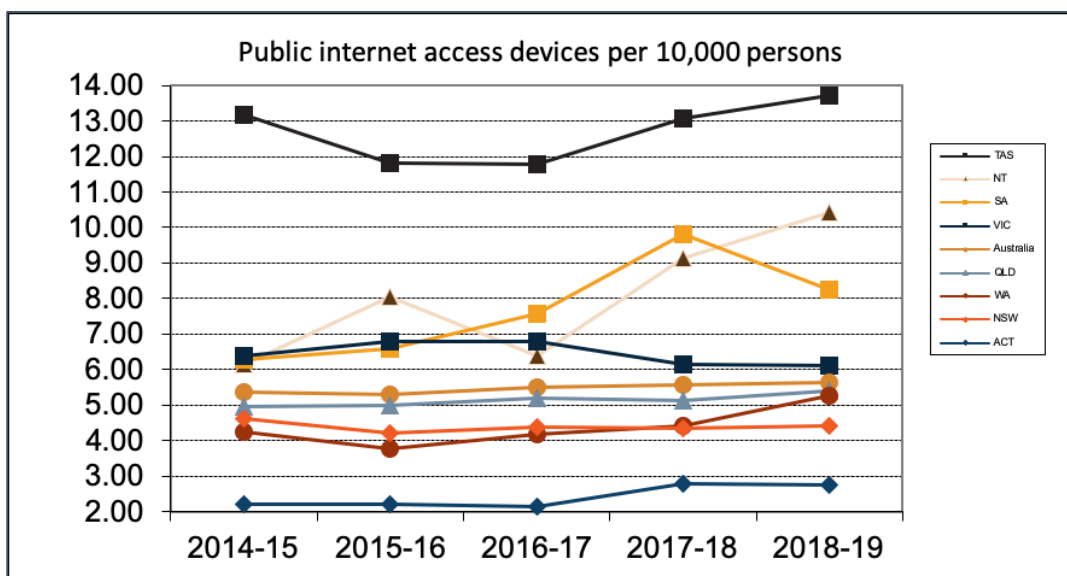
The total number of public access internet devices increased significantly over the five-year period (11.8%), with all states and territories reporting increases. The most significant increases were the Northern Territory (70.7%), South Australia (35.6%) and the ACT (34.5%).

2.4.2 Public access internet devices per 10,000 persons

The trend is repeated, with the number of public access internet devices per 10,000 persons increasing by 4.8% over the five-year period. All states and territories reported increases, with the most significant increases in the Northern Territory (69.8%) and South Australia (31.5%).

2.5 Library programs

2.5.1 Total number of library programs

The number of programs provided by public libraries increased by 45.9% to more than 273,000 over the five-year period. All states and territories reported significant percentage growth.

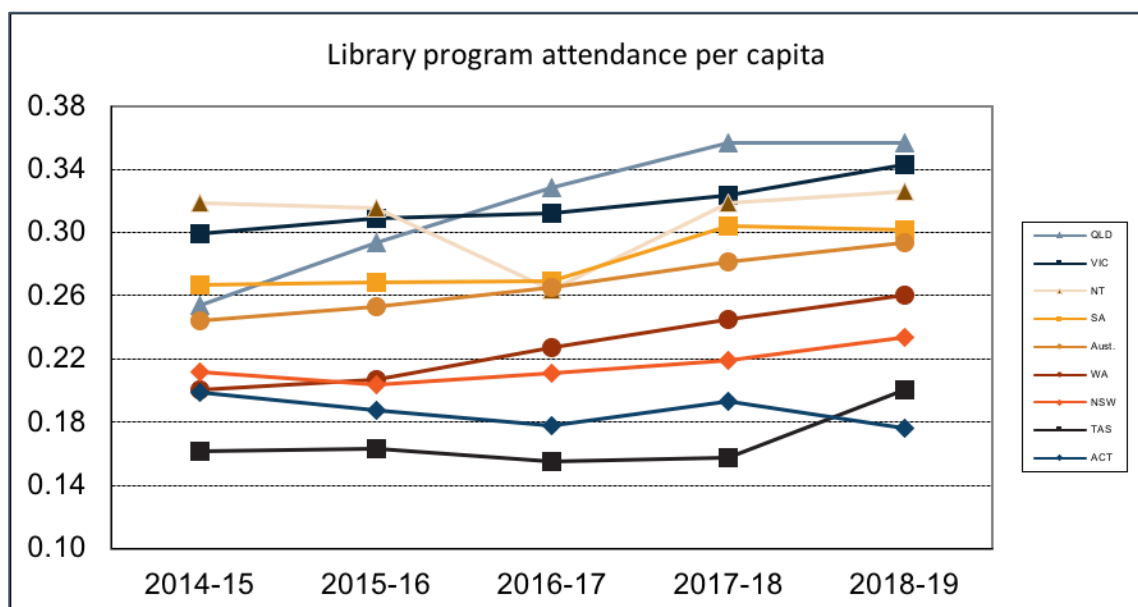
2.5.2 Library program attendance

The attendance at programs provided by public libraries increased by 28% to more than 7.4 million over the five-year period. The largest increases were reported in Queensland (49.7%) and Western Australia (31.3%), with the ACT reporting the only decrease of 3.2%. Reported per capita attendance increased by 20.1% over the period, with the largest increase in Queensland (40.5%).

3. Commentary by state/territory

While this report aims to provide a broad snapshot of Australia's public library services, it must be noted that it is difficult to use this data to compare library services with each other.

Not least of the reasons for this are that public libraries are governed by a variety of administrative arrangements, ranging from services wholly delivered by the state/territory through to services wholly delivered by local government. As well, the significant variations in social and geographic criteria between and within jurisdictions create differing community demands and needs, affecting the type and scope of public library services provided. The diverse delivery methods used to provide public library services is also a factor.

With this in mind, each state and territory has provided some brief commentary below on the reporting period, noting any reasons for significant changes in service delivery or uptake.

Australian Capital Territory

The ACT's population continues to grow, and this is reflected in the per capita figures. An increase in expenditure on library services during 2018-19 shows additional budget to meet increased costs in areas including rental, staffing and furniture and fittings. It also includes some funding for new self-service equipment.

The number of library programs increased, however the total attendance decreased, possibly due to the more targeted nature of the programs. For example, technology programs saw a move to more one-on-one sessions, instead of group sessions, to meet the community demand for this. The libraries are also aware of greater use of public wi-fi, as well as access through internet connected computers provided by the library.

New South Wales

In 2018-19 expenditure on NSW public libraries increased by almost 19%, largely due to investment in new and improved libraries by a number of councils, and a record \$29.8 million allocated by the NSW Government through grants and subsidies programs. \$24.5 million of this was provided through the State Library, while \$5.3 million was distributed through the Regional Cultural Fund.

This investment increase will continue, with the NSW Government announcing in August 2018 that there will be an additional \$60 million provided to public libraries over the 4 years from 2019/20, including \$24 million in capital grants to assist library building and IT improvements.

Library usage was steady in comparison with the previous year, with visitation maintaining at approximately 34 million. Onsite internet access has been greatly boosted through the availability of wi-fi at every public library, and the State Library upgraded more than 120 public library wi-fi hotspots over the year. Attendance at onsite programs continues to be a growth area, with attendance nearing 1.9 million for the year.

Northern Territory

In 2018-19, expenditure on public library services rose in response to the implementation of a new five-year Public Library Funding Agreement by the Northern Territory Government which included an increase in funding allocations across Northern Territory library services.

Whilst loans of collection items continue to trend downward, library services are increasingly focused on providing digital access and training, with a significant increase in the number of public access internet devices. Several libraries have also taken up grants and training with Be Connected this year, to enable library staff to better support users in an increasingly connected world.

Program delivery and attendance continue to grow and diversify with an increase of 86% in the number of library programs delivered over a five-year period. Library staff are increasingly seeking to connect with community members by providing programs including STEAM clubs, digital training and job seeker programs in addition to traditional library program offerings such as storytime and author visits.

Queensland

During 2018-19 the Queensland Government provided \$29.9 million in financial support to councils operating library services in Queensland through the Public Library Grant program and *First 5 Forever*, a statewide program providing strong early literacy foundations for all Queensland children aged 0-5 years.

In July 2018 the Library Board of Queensland endorsed *Realising our potential: A vision for Queensland public libraries*. This strategic vision communicates a shared and aspirational future for Queensland public libraries and Indigenous Knowledge Centres and guides State Library of Queensland's service offer, including the administration of grants, professional development

and other statewide projects.

Public libraries reported increases across a broad range of statistical measures for 2018-19, including expenditure, collections, programs and services. Highlights include attendances at library programs over the five-year period increasing by more than 48% and electronic collections now representing almost 19% of all collection usage. The availability of wi-fi continued to expand with more than 262 facilities offering this service, a 14% increase over the previous year.

South Australia

In 2018-2019, expenditure on public library services increased by more than 6% compared to the previous financial year, partly attributed to CPI increase in state funding, and building works at two metropolitan libraries in Port Adelaide Enfield and Mitcham City Councils.

The Memorandum of Agreement between State and Local Government supports the funding of public libraries in South Australia and ensures that both governments build significant investment in public libraries and achieve the key outcomes of the South Australian Strategic Plan. State funding in excess of \$19 million in 2018/19 contributed to the operations and materials budgets of all public libraries.

During this period digital loans of ebooks, emagazines and eaudiobooks increased by more than 50% against the previous financial year period. Digital loans have been progressively increasing over past years due to the development of curated collections and increased promotions, as well as an increase in the budget allocation.

The number of adult and children's library programs increased by approximately 38% and 12% respectively and can be attributed to a focus on centralised, statewide programs and partnerships, including Tech Savvy Seniors, Digital Springboard, and the Little Bang Discovery Club programs.

Tasmania

Annual per capita use of our collection increased for the first time since 2014-15, up by 2.2% from the 2017-18 fiscal year. This turnaround reflects the impact of the first year of the Tasmanian Government's four-year Contemporary Library Resources funding. Funded initiatives for 2018-19 aimed at increasing lending included: a targeted expansion of the print and electronic lending collections; introducing console game lending; increasing the format range of current titles; and the extension to more libraries of the Express Book service, which provides immediate lending access to new, popular titles. Libraries Tasmania also removed late fees and fines on lending items in December 2018, removing a significant barrier for some existing members, as well as encouraging new members to engage with our lending collection. In the four months following this initiative, membership increased by 8,000 people, many of whom had outstanding fines.

Libraries Tasmania continued to implement our new Strategic Directions 2018-2021, which included a focus on supporting Tasmanians to develop skills to use digital technologies and information effectively, and a focus on playing a vital role in supporting literacy and numeracy development at every life stage. These focuses were aided by the establishment of two new teams in 2018, which provided support for the organisation to continuously improve our clients' experiences. This was achieved through better use of client activity and client outcomes data, and review and evaluation of services and programs, contributing to increased engagement in our library programs. Attendance continued to increase in the 2018-19 year, growing by 28% since 2017-18.

In the 2018-19 period there were 5,862 attendances in 1,736 digital inclusion programs and courses. Support for clients, particularly older people, to better use technology was aided by accessing Be Connected grants and resources. In a client and member survey in the period, 86.45% of respondents told us they felt more confident using digital technology after gaining support from our staff, including volunteers, or participating in courses.

Libraries Tasmania supports literacy and numeracy development for all ages. There were 48,126 attendances at 2,166 children's programs and events in the period, including Rock & Rhyme and storytime sessions, and national events such as National Simultaneous Storytime. We also supported adults to develop their literacy and numeracy skills through our one-to-one volunteer-based literacy service, as well as attracting 5,927 attendances in 545 English Conversation Group and Literacy Skills Development programs.

Victoria

Public Libraries Victoria's 2018-19 statistical survey compiled data from all 48 public library services, including municipal libraries, regional library corporations, library networks and Vision Australia. The survey captured the statistical information summarised in this report, as well as targeted data on early years indicators and LOTE collections. In addition to local use of the data for benchmarking and library reviews, the data has been used to inform the statewide Libraries Change Lives advocacy campaign.

Total library funding from state and local governments stabilised in 2018-19 after a significant drop in real per capita terms in

2017-18. Per capita attendance at libraries' literacy, learning, cultural and social engagement programs continues to increase. Increased turnover of both physical and digital items demonstrates hard-working collections that are adapting to demand from different library users and progressively shifting the balance between physical and digital formats.

Western Australia

Information gathered from Western Australia's 233 public libraries for 2018–2019 showed a rise in most metrics except for collections and loans of physical items. These decreases were countered by increases in the numbers of online resources made available and the loan (download) of these resources that include ebooks, eaudiobooks and emagazines.

Loans of physical items and membership are no longer the main indicators of public library usage. Many patrons visit or use the services of the public library for purposes other than borrowing library materials, such as library programs and events for children and adults or using the Internet and online services. The growing importance and popularity of library programs is demonstrated by a 7% increase in the number of attendances. In addition, with the availability of online resources at home and via mobile devices, many public library patrons chose to visit their public library online rather than in person with a 36% increase in the loans of online resources by public library members between 2017–2018 and 2018-2019.
